SAN FRANCISCO – **San Francisco State University's Department of Theatre Arts** and **School of Music and Dance** present Kurt Weill's musical adaptation of *Street Scene*, **Thursday, May 1** through **Sunday, May 4** in the **McKenna Theatre.** Part Broadway show, part opera, *Street Scene* explodes with tragedy, humor and suspense as the story reveals a day in the life of a 1930s New York City tenement. Directed by **Jenny Lord**, with vocal direction by **Alissa Deeter** and performances by the **SFSU Symphony Orchestra**, conducted by **Gregory Magie**, *Street Scene* is adored for its score, with lyrics by Langston Hughes, adapted from Elmer Rice's 1928 Pulitzer Prize-winning play.

Frank Maurrant struggles to maintain control as a husband and father. Anna worries about Rose, the couple's teenager. Rose struggles with the repercussions of interfaith romance and independence.
