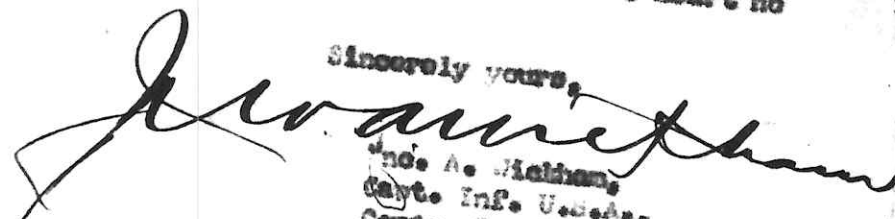

To the Men Honorably Discharged from the Twelfth Division:

I part with the soldiers of the 12th Division with keenest regret. My feeling of comradeship toward you has grown from day to day since I came to Camp Devens a few months ago, and, with your help, began to organize and to train this Division for war service.

The high state of efficiency reached by this Division, in so short a period, is an expression of patriotism, loyalty, spirit, intelligence and energy of all, and it is reflected by each one of you in performance of duty, obedience, orderliness, neat and manly appearance, self respect and esprit-de-corps.

But our Commander in Chief has decided that the emergency, which called us together for strenuous battle training, has passed sufficiently to warrant the discharge of a number of you in order that you may return to your homes, and take up again the work which you left to come here.

While I share with you disappointment at not having had an opportunity to meet the test of battle, for which this Division was developed, I trust that you share with me the belief that the Plymouth Division, even at Camp Devens, was one of the potential forces which hastened the surrender of our country's enemies, and that, therefore, the work of the Division for the past five months has been worth while. Moreover, I believe that all of us have been benefited in the development of our patriotism, pride of citizenship, neatness, self respect, self denial, spirit of aggressiveness, as well as in our training to do many things which will be of value in civil life.

It has been my greatest honor to Command this Combat Division of patriotic, loyal, capable, energetic men. Though you may leave it one by one, its good name is in your hands and I am confident that you will cherish it with increasing pride and devotion.

My best wishes go with you throughout the coming years.

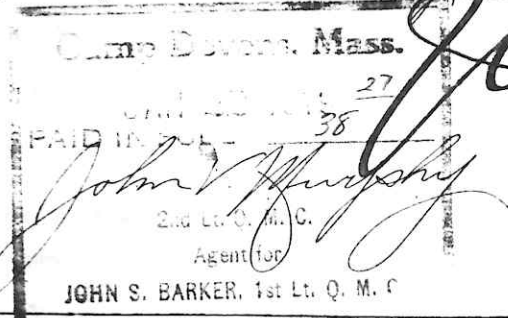
